## **Bizarre Patterns of Self-injury in Schizophrenia - A** case report

Apart from suicide self-inflicted injuries are the most severe symptoms of schizophrenia. The high suicide rate of 10% during the course of disease and the even higher rate of suicide attempts (50%) are well known (1).

Less known are the bizarre self-mutilations, usually without suicidal ideation, such as autocastration, enucleation of the eye and amputation of hand or tongue. Those are often related to religious delusions predicting a particularly severe course of disease (2). Although the manifestation of coenesthetic hallucinations and delusionary symptoms in the genital region is well known, only few cases of genital self-mutilation are published until now (3,4).

We would like to report the case of a 27-year-old first-episode schizophrenic patient who castrated himself in hospital after partial remission. This too was probably related to religious delusions related to sexual contacts during the prodromal phase of the disease.
